RESULTS of P.S.A. (SC)² CONTEST on 31 MAY 1987

ARE WE FLYING TOO HIGH ?

During our monthly contest, June 14, we had a number of pilots who were flying well above 1000 ft. altitude. This "HIGH FLYING" caused some concern to the Costa Mesa Police helicopter. They were involved with a stolen vehicle recovery at the Marion Parsons school when the chopper pilot noted several gliders at 1300 ft. The Sergeant in-charge of the helicopters was in the helicopter and requested one of the Black & Whites to contact us at the field and find out why we were so high (1000 ft. is F.A.A. maximum) and to bring them down.

Later in the week I contacted the "Watch Commander" and he said it was just an "Incident" on the log, with no report made. Nothing further would be done concerning the 'HIGH FLYING' and for us to not be worried about problems from the incident.

The helicopter Sergeant said the same thing but requested that we be more vigilant about flying above 1000 ft. altitude. I told him that it is sometimes very difficult to determine when we are at 1000 ft. with 6-10 ft. gliders. He agreed and said they would advise us with the P.A. system when we are over 1000 ft. altitude and not to worry about any further report.


F3E CONTEST PRACTICE JUNE 21, 1987

Having 180 seconds, including, motor run, to gain altitude and make as many one way trips as possible, is not an easy task. Many pilots ran out of altitude before time ran out or went diagonally across the course. Everyone needs more practice! Including timers and observers. There will be another practice session. The date has not been determined as of this writing. Please plan to attend the practice and contest, as we will need many timers & observers for the two day event, August 15,16. Because of the large prize and prestige involved, we must make every effort to have an error free event. Don't forget there will be prizes for the contest workers!

We certainly want to put on a good contest, keeping HARBOR SDARING SOCIETIES reputation intact.



MINUTES OF THE JUNE 3, 1987 HSS GENERAL CLUB MEETING

Will Conrad brought the meeting to order at 7:35 pm. The turnout was relatively light this evening, when compared to the last three or four meetings. The minutes for the May, 1987 meeting (as they appeared in the June newsletter) were approved and voted into the record by the club members in attendance.

Treasurer report by Tom Pastore was read and approved. Jack Vail, Rodger Lowery, and Ray Westland were introduced to the club as the new faces in attendance.

Under new business: Upcoming contests were announced by Will Conrad. On June 7th, there is a hand launch contest scheduled at Riverside hosted by the Inland Soaring Society. Our club contest originally scheduled for the 7th, will be held on the 14th, CD'd by Rich Garner. The standard 3-5-7 contest with landing gates will be run. Ross Thomas will CD an electric contest on June 21st. Ross announced the tasks for his contest and also noted that on this same day we plan to set up an F3E course for people to practice on in preparation for Felix's F3E contest later this season.

The June SCSC contest will be held on the 28th and hosted by the North County Clouds. A map showing how to get to their field was included in last months newsletter. Frank Chasteler gave a report on the recent SCSC contest hosted by PSA. The July SCSC contest will be hosted by the Pasadena Soaring Society at their field next to the Rose Bowl. Three rounds for expert and sportsman: 1st round 3 minute precision/duration, 2nd round 6 minute precision/duration, 3rd round is a 7 minute precision/duration. Short lines will be used to give the advantage to those that zoom launch.

More new faces were announced as they arrived at the meeting: Mike Ekstrand and Robert Freeman stood up and introduced themselves to the club. Rich Garner announced that the Blue Angels were giving an exibition at El Toro Marine Air Station during the upcoming weekend.

Will Conrad introduced the idea of creating a "builders guild" within the HSS. The plan is to either hold organized sessions for newcomers where construction techniques are taught, or to make select club "master" builders available on a volunteer basis to assist the new builder on a one-to-one basis. The merits of each idea along with hybrid ideas were discussed at length. In the final analysis Tony Lee was volunteered (in absentia) to coordinate a plan whereby a novice builder be put in touch with a willing expert builder when and if the need arose. On a related note, Will Conrad announced that he had made arrangements to purchase two copies of a video tape which details fiberglassing techniques. This tape is available through SULA and is reported to be very informative. If the interest is there, and time permits, it will hopefully be shown at our next meeting.

Rich Garner proposed that HSS put on a public relations type of event to promote our sport. The idea of a mall show seemed acceptable to several of the club members in attendance. New club member Jack Vail volunteered as the committee chairman to start planning a mall show for later in the season (fall '87). Jack solicited volunteers for the committee and obtained a good response.

Dick Panzer informed the club that we recieved a complaint from the folks who donate our meeting place to us. It seems that after our last meeting, the place was left in a mess. Whereas most of us felt that there had surely been a mistake, lets at least be more aware of the situation and do our part to maintain our welcome here. Dick finished his announcement by displaying some spiffy HSS emblazoned sport shirts that were available to club members.

The program for the evening consisted of a show and tell by Ross Thomas and a PBS video taped show. Ross displayed and described his carbon fiber reinforced gorilla proof Gnome, and after a short break, Will presented a video tape which included the reconstruction of a Jenny biplane.

Individual issues of the Club Newsletter may exceed the club budget, but the total cost for a full year of publication must not exceed the approved budget.

ARTICLE X
