### This Month's Featured Model

Our featured plane for this month belongs to HSS Member Don Hofeldt. This P-51 is another big beautiful example of what is possible with the newer more powerful electric motors. This is a conversion of the Kyosho ARF model intended for .40 cu. in. engines, but Don is using an AXI brushless outrunner with direct drive, and a Jeti 70 Amp programmable speed control. The wingspan is 56", and he uses 18 of the 3300 mAh NiMH cells that provide 32 Amps to drive the Zinger 12 x 10 prop at 8900 RPM. At 8 lbs 6 oz, the plane flies fast, but it goes where Don points it and it does rolls, flies inverted and even drops bombs. The landings are pretty hot, so Don is planning to add flaps. ### AMA Convention 2004

The annual Academy of Model Aeronautics Convention for 2004 was held at the Ontario convention center on January 9,10 and 11. This was a new venue for the convention, and it brought in more people from the Riverside and San Bernardino area that found the location more convenient. The show was great as usual, with lots of fun stuff and great prices.

Your editor was particularly impressed with a new company that is producing beautiful models from the experimental aviation arena. Experimental Aircraft Models (EAM) produces 1/5 scale replicas of real experimental or home built aircraft. They have seven ARF models including the Challenger II, which is a high wing ultralight pusher, and a huge Velocity XL canard. Their web site is <u>www.rchomebuilts.com</u> and definitely worth checking out.

Your Adopt-A-School instructor, accompanied by Karl Hawley, attended the AMA Education Committee Round Table Discussion, held on Saturday. This was a meeting attended by 20 representatives from Southern California model clubs. Primary topics included setting AMA standards for training and certifying both students and trainers/educators. Everyone was enthusiastic about AMA guidelines, but many wanted to make the conditions voluntary, and keep the qualification process in the hands of each club. Everyone recognized the problem of nation wide certification of instructors in particular. A second topic involved using educational services and activities as leverage to gain local government support for flying sites. Now that is a sophisticated concept.

Some of the significant points that emerged from the group included the suggestion to join the local Chamber of Commerce. One club claimed to have the police chief and the school district director taking free flying lessons from them. Another suggestion was to get companies to match the YES grants that the AMA gives out. A third suggestion was to ensure that adults as well as youths were emphasized in training programs.

# Flight School

I have been eager to re-publish some of the great articles that may be of help to so many of us who are trying to learn to fly, so here is another one. This is an excerpt from Mike Deckman's article on Common Problems in Thermal Soaring.

**Problem**: Not finding thermals, despite obvious thermal activity.

- Concentration and alertness are primary ingredients.
- Flying experience helps. If you still have to concentrate hard on flying your plane, your attention to thermal indicators will be diverted. If this is the case, practice with an emphasis on flying until it becomes second nature.
- Search for thermals with a plan. Don't just launch and hope you stumble into a thermal.
- Know the thermal indicators (by watching your plane).
- Do not jump from plane to plane. Fly the same plane and learn its characteristics.
- There is no substitute for stick time.

**Problem:** Not knowing the difference between a workable thermal and a "teaser".

- A teaser thermal is one that does not have sufficient diameter and strength to work within your plane's performance envelope.
- Remember, if you are not going up, leave and continue searching.
- **Problem:** Turning too soon or in the wrong direction when lift is encountered.
  - Turn towards the uplifted wing.
  - Count three seconds before turning, after lift is encountered. If you turn too quickly, you may fly right out of the thermal and think that you turned in the wrong direction.
  - If you turned in the wrong direction, continue the turn until lift is encountered again.

**Problem**: Not centering (locating the best lift position) in the thermal.

- Explore the thermal to determine its size and shape.
- Use centering process to adjust position into the best lift. If lift varies during the turn, open up the circle towards the better lift and then resume a normal turning diameter. Note if the lift varies during the new position. If it does, adjust position again.
- Note: Make only small corrections. If you over correct, you may lose more than if you under corrected.

- After the sailplane has been climbing for a while, explore again to see if the plane is still in the best lift.
- When entering a thermal on a windy day, search downwind from other planes in the thermal. Many pilots do not keep up with the thermal drift on windy days.
- Sometimes the core is all there is! Work these thermals tight and be on the lookout to make quick adjustments.

**Problem**: Not increasing speed when sink is encountered or when you are downwind and trying to get back to the field.

- Your control inputs should reinforce the effects of the air mass movements your plane is in. If the plane is going up, pull back on the stick (so as to slow down a little). If the plane is going down, push forward on the stick.
- In sink, push forward on the stick to increase air speed to get out of the sink area.
- When you are low and downwind, increase air speed to get back to the field. You are not looking for maximum time in the air under this condition!

**Problem**: Inconsistent flight path control.

• If you move the control stick with your thumb, make a concerted effort to learn to use the index finger and thumb instead.

**Problem:** Problems controlling or maintaining proper thermal turns.

• Do not "flick" the control stick. You are flying with a proportional control system. Use It!

### Adopt-A-School Status Report for December 2003

The AMA offers a one-time opportunity for financial assistance to charter clubs operating educational programs such as our Adopt-A-School program. This activity is called the Youth Education Stipend or YES grant. Funding limits are \$500. We have submitted our proposal, which requests \$456 (we didn't want to seem too greedy). They are due by the first of January each year, which is why we had not submitted one previously. If approved, the funds will be awarded to HSS for purchase of a radio system, a copy of the computer simulator program RealFlight G2 Lite, and expendables like props and stuff.

Flying classes continued at the Boys and Girls Club of Huntington Valley, but our Thursday meeting time has been obliterated with Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years holidays. While only one or two students attend our Saturday flight training at Fairview, the opportunity to work one-on-one gives a much more concentrated learning experience. At least three students have obtained their own planes and radios during Christmas. Offers of assistance in assembly have been extended. Will Conrad (venerable editor of Plane Rap for many years) is now assisting in flight training with our Adopt-A-School program. He has a wonderfully friendly approach with the kids, and has a way of really catching their attention. Thanks for your help Will, and I hope all that youthful exuberance doesn't wear you out!

Organization of new classes has been slow due to the holidays. We will begin another series of classes at the Boys and Girls Club in late January or early February. The classes at Fulton Middle School in Fountain Valley are still planned for late January. Continuation of classes at Heninger Elementary School is on hold.

Be sure to see the recognition of Harbor Soaring Society in the February 2004 issue of AMA's Model Aviation magazine on page 180. District Ten Vice President Richard Hanson included a good description of our program, along with a reprint of the Costa Mesa Daily Pilot photo from the Sunday June 1, 2003 issue.

### HSS January 4, 2004 Thermal Duration Contest Results

First things first, with the strong showing of electric flyers at the old thermal field our contests will start at 10:00 AM on the first Sunday of each month. It works better.

For the January 4<sup>th</sup> competition, the rules were as follows:

Tasks:	40 minutes. As many flights as it takes
Landing:	100 point tape.
Twist No.1:	Must land on the minute.
Twist No. 2:	Total landing score divided by # of flight attempts.
Scoring:	100 points per minute. 5 pps off the minute. 4000 flight points
-	possible. 100 landing. 4100 total.

I did a similar format last year but this time every flight was a precision task. We round up from 30 seconds to the higher minute and only used the whole minute against your target. It's easy to score this way and leaves you with a whole minute target.

Advantages of this format:

- 1. Long target time.
- 2. Long flight times.
- 3. Everyone can make the target.
- 4. Challenging enough to keep you alert when you get a bit low.
- 5. Enough penalty points to make it interesting.

Slight Santa Ana's, so the field was reversed and the contest started. I was the first to launch, after all, I needed a trim flight. Well, 40 minutes later and 16 or so small thermals, I found out I needed landing practice. 39:59 and a Zero. I suck. What can I say.
