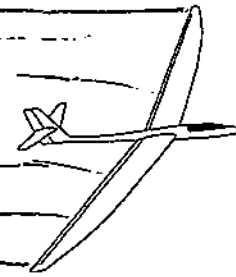

Now Just One Cotton Picking Minute...

To the uninitiated, the Fall Soaring Festival in Visalia carries a certain amount of prestige and mystique. Serving as the soaring community's equivalent to a Grateful Dead concert, expectations can run impossibly high. The reality, however, manages to exceed the hype.

Visalia is located between Bakersfield and Fresno, somewhere in the heart of the hazy fertility that is the San Joaquin Valley. Arriving a day or two early is a good idea, as field conditions vary from year to year. By late morning Friday, there are dozens of cars, trucks and motor homes with one group of pilots tossing HLGs, another with hi-starts and several more crowding the available winches. The breeze often blows in a downwind direction, the temperature a comfortable 80 degrees and a lack of visual horizon references leads a certain strangeness to the setting. The flying site is very flat with cotton as far as the eye can see and the neatly clipped grass of the landing area is inviting and overall, the field is beautifully kept.

Stepping up to the winch for some practice flights reinforces the festival atmosphere. Old friends mingle with new, and the conversation is casual. To borrow from SULA member Steve Addis, "This contest is 80% social and 20% contest." There is no distinction between newcomers and seasoned pilots. All are welcome and share a common bond of having traveled to the edge of nowhere to fly model sailplanes.

By Saturday morning though, everything has changed. The air is cool but that's not the only thing making teeth chatter. First round is set to open at 8:00, and when they say eight, they mean eight. Coming early is almost a necessity, because by seven there is a sea of steel, canvas, fiberglass and obeechi as 240 pilots, along with family and friends have descended upon the CVRC site. Vendors have set up booths and each club has staked out its domain. As everyone awaits the calling of the first flight group, the tension eliminates the need for dietary fiber. Honors went to HSS member Matt Forquer, who not only was in the inaugural group, but the first name called.

The beauty of a called flight order is that 240 pilots can fly four rounds by early afternoon. The down side is a very limited choice of air. Conditions can change dramatically from one launch to the next. Wind shifts and lift can be as fickle as a politician in November and therein lies the challenge. Run a deep search pattern and hit the "wet dream" one flight and the next be cursing Eli Whitney while trudging through cotton fields forever.

Once the initial flight is out of the way, the atmosphere shifts to one of friendly competition, as people talk shop, grab a beer, or go to admire the ever growing motherlode of raffle prizes. Club tents line the landing area, with critiques coming as naturally as the oohs and ouches. The grass that looked so nice and inviting yesterday is suddenly bouncy and unyielding. Countless planes twist out of the spot, and the little dirt berm at the back of the field becomes a merciless model-eating monster. T-tail stabs pop off and steep approaches are rewarded with inverted landings. Humility is the lesson of the day, as even the best pilots fall short. Remarkably camaraderie and sportsmanship prevail, as competitors share congratulations and condolences. By the end of the first day's flying, the mood is relaxed and comfortable. An impromptu hand launch event is held, drawing hoots and cheers from a friendly crowd.

Sunday is a virtual carbon-copy of Saturday, with a slight lowering of anxiety levels. Prior to first flight there is time to survey the booths set up by various sailplane oriented vendors. Friendly chatter replaces sales pitches as these hawkers are more interested in yakking about the latest trends than pushing their products. Again, the festival atmosphere permeates the event.

As the contest draws to a close, a drama begins to take shape. Updated scores are posted and it becomes clear that there will be a fly-off between defending champion Roger Lackey and Joe Wurts, who has probably won everything in the world *but* Visalia. Epic. Unfortunately the entire contest comes down to a three minute flight with a tape landing. It's like deciding the British Open on a miniature golf course or the World Series in a batting cage. In the end, both pilots nailed their times and Joe's 96 landing edges out Roger's 93. Time for trophies and the raffle.

The raffle at Visalia has its own near-legendary status. It is amazing to behold the booty which ranges from models and computer radios to drill presses and barbecues to trips to Guatemala and full scale sailplane lessons. A worthy distraction while the printer spits out final scores and team totals.

While kudos are exchanged and planes are stowed, it is interesting to note that almost everyone has a positive attitude. Win or lose, good performance or bad, everyone has had a great time and leaves with a sense of having participated in something more than a simple contest. There is a reason why people come from as far as Guatemala and Vermont to participate. This is an event, something to remember and something to look forward to next year. And who knows? Maybe next year they'll have tied T-shirts.

Article I, Section 4,Substitution for last sentence.

- Current: "No officer, except the General Director, Editor and Treasure may serve consecutive terms in the same office."
- Proposed: "President and Vice-President are limited to two consecutive terms in office. General Director, Editor, Secretary and Treasurer may serve consecutive terms in office."
- Reason: Current rule inhibits continuity of leadership by willing individuals and safeguards against abuse of power are allowed for elsewhere in the constitution

Article I, Section 6.....Substitution at end of sentence to correct a typographical error.

- Current:Article II section 11.
- Proposed:Article II section 11.

___ *For* ___ *Against*

Article II, Section 10.....Additional reasons for removal of an HSS Officer from the Board.

- Current: N/A
- Proposed: "Any officer who absents himself/herself from three consecutive monthly General Meeting or Executive Board Meeting may be replaced consistent with the manner stated above."
- Reason: To insure that members of the board remain active in the leadership of the club. That the board position does not become purely a "title" but remains an integral part of the club.

Article V, Section 1.....Replacement of an entire section.

- Current: The annual membership dues of the Society shall be no greater than:
- 1.) Senior (18 or older)-----\$20.00
 - 2.) Junior (17 or under)-----\$10.00
 - 3.) Special (Senior Members Family)-----\$ 5.00
- Proposed: The annual membership dues of the Society shall be no greater than:
- 1.) Senior (18 or older)-----\$25.00

 - 4.) HSS Board Member-----No charge while in office.

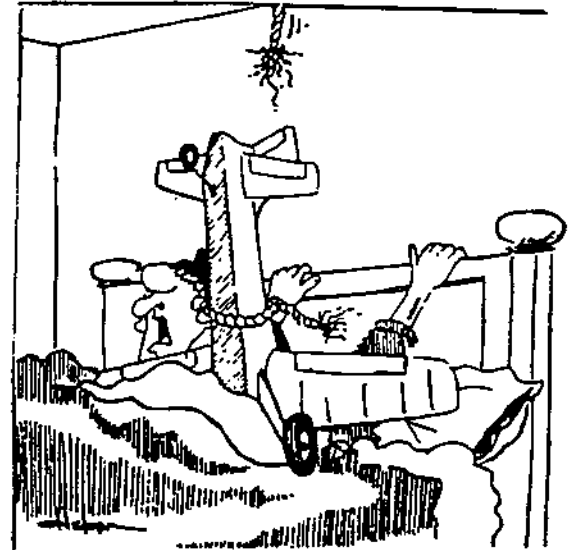

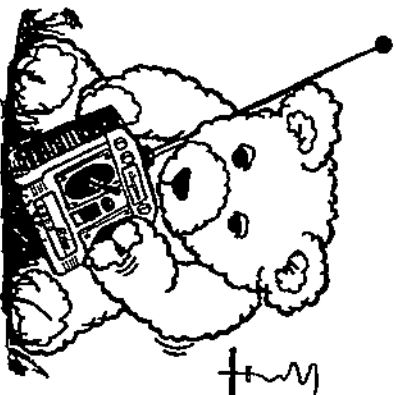

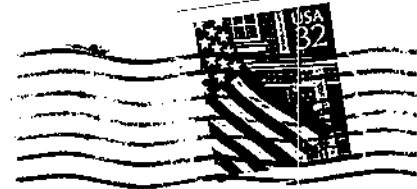
