October Meeting Minutes

The meeting was brought to order at 7:35 pm on October 7, 1987 at our usual meeting place in Costa Mesa. The meeting minutes of the September, 1987 meeting were approved and voted into record by the club members in attendance. The treasurers report was then given.

Old Business: The SC² contest at SULA was cancelled and rescheduled for November 29, 1987. The October newsletter published the wrong date. Take note that this is the Sunday after Thanksgiving.

Will Conrad stated that there was no new information about what the city is doing to our flying field.

Pete Richardson discussed how the October club contest was going to be scored. He went into great detail as to how each of the three rounds were going to be scored. Attend the contest for a more detailed description.

Felix Vivas thanked the club members for their great support at the F3E contest. He also wanted to know if the club would consider putting in a bid to host the F3E team selection. Hosting the team selection would require club members to be available for four days and would happen sometime in June 1988. Mike Charles recommended that the club not wait long to make a decision. The bid has to be submitted by January 15, 1988. Will Conrad suggested that we wait until after the new officer election takes place and let the new administration handle the decision.

New Business: Will Conrad stated that membership dues should be announced in the November newsletter to expedite collection and allow enough time for the members to pay their dues before they go up. It was decided to wait until the new board meets after the November election and let them set the dues rate and club policies. The dues structure was discussed and what costs were covered by the dues. Frank Chasteler made a motion that the present board analyze and recommend a budget for next year for the new board. The contest will consist of three rounds of thermal sailplane flying. The tasks are as follows. The first round will be a two minute precision scored 500/500. The flight points will be scored per the bell curve in the AMA rule book with a standard landing circle. The second and third rounds will be your choice of a five or nine minute precision duration. The nine minute flight will be scored 900/100 with a standard landing circle. The five minute flight will be scored 800/200 with a vee shaped landing area.

Harbor Soaring Society Hand Launch Contest

Date: Saturday, December 5th, 1987

Place: Harbor Soaring Society Field, Costa Mesa Time: 8 am registration begins, 9 am Pilot's meeting

Entry Fee: \$5.00

Sailplane Size: Unlimited Contest Director: Mike Charles Trophies: 1st through 5th place

Four rounds of hand launched sailplane flying will be flown, weather permiting and at the CD's discretion. The best three of four rounds will be counted.

Task 1: The first task will consist of a FAI type two lap speed run over a 50 meter course, which means up and back. The pilot will be given two minutes to *complete* the course. The pilot will have an unlimited number of throws. The times will be normalized to the fastest time in the task; the fastest time receives a score of 1000 points.

Task 2: This task will have a ten minute working window. The pilot will have an unlimited number of launches. The single longest flight of each pilot will be normalized against the longest flight of any pilot in that flight group. 1000 points will be awarded to the pilot with the longest flight in each flight group.

Task 3: This task will have a ten minute working window. The pilot will have an unlimited number of launches. The target time for the task will be five minutes. The pilot with the flight time closest to five minutes will receive 1000 points. The other pilots' scores in that flight group will be normalized to the winner's.

Task 4: This task will have a ten minute working window. The pilot will have six launches. The best five flights will be counted for a total time with a max flight of two minutes. The best time will receive 1000 points with the other times in that flight group normalized to the best.

Presidents Message:

Just a note to let you know what is happening with the HSS club. At our last board meeting it was decided to keep the dues at their current level for next year. This is in anticipation of needing finances to help Costa Mesa with improvements at our flying field. The 1988 membership application will be found elsewhere in this newsletter. As most of you know our next meeting on November 4th, is election night for our new officers. In order to have a voice in the election you must be present to vote or be elected. There are some positions with none or one nomination. Lets give ourselves at least a choice by nominating at least two for each position. ACCEPT a nomination and VOTE!

I want to thank my fellow club members for all their hard work for the F3E contest I organized last September as well as thank the club for its generosity in paying the two-day toilet fee to the City.

In the same vein I would like to bring to your attention a situation we should consider, for the club and members to extend a helping hand and effort again!

Because of the interest generated by our F3E contest, instead of only a small handful of experienced F3E pilots, we now have some new fresh faces wanting a shot at making the U.S. F3E team to compete in the 1988 World Championship.

If our club was to host the AMA F3E team selection on our field, it would mean various newcomers from our ranks would not have to bear the added financial burden of flying back east with excess luggage costs to compete at a strange field living out of a suitcase with the added costs of room/board/car rental, etc., thus eliminating a chance for some of them to make the team because they couldn't go.

I would like my fellow club members to vote at our next club meeting to send a bid to the U.S. AMA to hold the contest on our field in April, May or June. I know it would mean the majority of the club would have to give up a Saturday and Sunday of their flying but it would go to helping produce a larger amount of contestants from our own area and club to try for the U.S. team.

The downside of this is a four-day event (Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday) but the San Diego Club would help us with 10 to 12 volunteers. The upside would be \$200.00 to \$300.00 for the club treasury and some neat prizes for the helpers like I arranged for last time. And, knowing we helped give "new blood" a chance at making the team.



- LIMIT YOUR FLIGHTS TO 15-20 MINUTES WHEN OTHERS ARE WAITING YOUR FREQUENCY.
- 8. YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS OR AMA NUMBERS MUST BE IN OR ON YOUR PLANE.
- VISITORS: IN ORDER TO USE HSS CLUB MEMBER'S EQUIPMENT OR TO RECEIVE HELP IN FLYING YOUR MODEL, YOU MUST HAVE AMA INSURRANCE.

RADIO IMPOUND RULES

THIS IS A FREQUENCY CONTROL AREA

- 1. <u>NEVER</u> TURN ON YOUR TRANSMITTER WITHOUT A FREQLUENCY PIN.
- PLACE YOUR TRANSMITTER BY CHANNEL NUMBER IN ROWS.
- 3. WHEN YOUR TRANSMITTER COMES TO THE FRONT OF THE ROW AND YOUR FREQUENCY IS AVAILABLE, YOU FLY.
- 4. AFTER FLYING, COLLAPS YOUR ANTENNA, RETURN PIN TO BOARD, AND PLACE YOUR TRNASMITTER BEHIND THOSE IN YOUR ROW.
- 5. DOUBLE CHECK TO MAKE SURE YOUR TRANSMITTER POWER SWITCH IS OFF.
- 6. IT IS SUGGESTED YOU HAVE A NAME TAG ON YOUR TRANSMITTER——IF YOU DON'T HAVE ONE, ASK A CLUB MEMBER FOR ONE.
