Those Thrilling Days of Yesteryear

ROM: Wolf Hirth. "My Soaring Flight In New York City." National Glider and Airplane News. May 1931. On March 12, 1931, Wolf Hirth actually accomplished a true soaring flight that others had contemplated when he took off from Riverside drive. New York City, and soared above the Hudson river banks and upper Manhatten in his famous Musterle sailplane for al-

most an hour. Submitted by Richard H. Benbough.

"Some years ago, before I ever entered the United States. I was already contemplating the possibilities of making a soaring flight right in the city proper of New York. Studying the topographical conditions of this city from maps on hand, I found such a flight quite feasible.

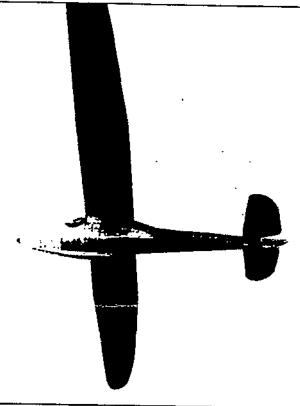
"But there were great difficulties to overcome, more that I had expected. After long and extensive scouting, I finally found a suitable launching place right on Riverside drive, the marvelous automobile road along the Hudson River. That there was no landing place below. except water, the icy waves of the river, was one disadvantage I had to take into consideration. However, the hardest task was to get the consent of the municipal authorities. For more than two months, petitions were sent to the different departments in question. Finally, after negotiations and patient waiting, I received the last one of the necessary permits at noon time on March 12th. One

look at the clouds, a phone call to the weather bureau, and I decided quickly. Why postpone something until tomorrow what can be done today?

We soon reached the little park, which I had chosen as a starting place — my Musterle was already assembled, waiting for me. I was received by high police officials who did not want to miss the chance to see a real soaring flight, and they told me that 60 policeman were assigned to keep order. That there was also an ambulance with doctor and stretcher waiting in the background, I was told only after I had landed. I had to assure the officials in charge of the flight again and again that I would not trespass the restricted flight areas, and that I would not fly above the high buildings until I had reached at least 1000 feet.

"Now everything was set for the start. The tail of my plane anchored to a truck standing on the drive, twenty men had hold of the double launching shock cord, ready to pull. Their running space was

quite limited, only about 90 to 100 feet separated them from the steep descent of 70to 90 feet down to the river. Newsreel and newspaper photographers got busy-then a short command and the launching crew started to run. When they had almost reached the edge of the decline, I released the tail anchoring, and like an arrow, my plane shot into the upcurrents. The lifting force of those cur-



rents was quite stronger than I had anticipated, and after the first ten seconds I was about 100 feet high. Making the first turn, I passed almost 200 feet above the starting point, and it was only 30 seconds since I started. Steadily my plane gained altitude, and soon I could look down onto the twelve and fifteen story buildings.

"It was quite a unique view that I had. Before me, the Hudson River, with its afternoon traffic, numerous steamers and ferries furrowing the surface of the stream. Looking in the other direction, I saw the streets jammed with cars, and the white patches of uplifted faces of thousands of onlookers, waiving at the 'Bird'. Amazing was the number of children, especially the boys who came to see the glider. They probably knew more about what was going on than many of the grown-ups, of whom the greater part probably had no idea that the bird in the air was flying without any motor.

"Hundreds of interesting things pro-

vided new impression during the entire time. When my altimeter showed 600 feet above the starting point, I went on short excursions. Down river to 15th Street, and back again to 172nd Street. This was the farthest I was allowed to fly, keeping my promise given to the police. Too bad, as it would not have been difficult at all to fly all the way down to the Battery. I was very much

tempted to do so when I reached 1000 feet, but at the last moment remembered my promise. I contented myself in circling the New York head of the New Hudson River Bridge.

"Looking down on the headquar- . ters after I had been flying about 30 minutes, I saw three men frantically waving red flags. What did they want? Did something happen? The roar of the wind was tremendous and drowned out every other noise. To find out what they wanted, and to be able to hear their voice, I had to fly lower. Pointing the nose of my sailplane to the Palisades, I left the up-current area. Mid-river I still had about 750 feet altitude, and it would have been easy to continue my flight to Jersey. Turning back, steadily loosing altitude, I met very bumpy currents, and my ship was thrown about a great deal. In the park they were still giving signals, and this time their meaning was obvious: Order to land.

"That's tough. My intention was to fly at least two hours, and now only 40 minutes had elapsed. It was

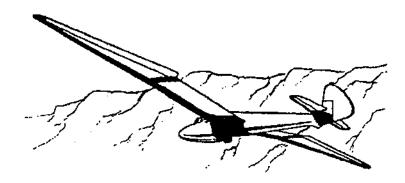
almost five o'clock, and time the factories and offices close, and the police wanted to reopen the drive for the rush. Not to disappoint the Police Department who so generously helped in the realization of my plans, I went in for the landing, but I admit it was not to my liking. This landing was the most difficult task of my whole flying carrier. Calling on all of my experience gathered in hundreds of flights and with the help of Madame Luck I made it, and after a short slide, my plane stopped near the end of the landing space.

"What now followed seemed like a dream. Thousands of boys, enthusiastic followers of gliding and soaring sport, congratulating friends, in front my dear Hawley Bowius, America's master in the art of soaring; members of the Police Department, showing contented faces, for nothing happened. This flight and everything connected with it, will always be one of my dearest memories."

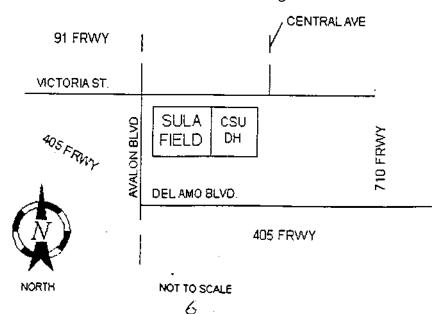
